Explore Bangkok - A Must See

Wat Phra Kaew (Temple of The Emerald Buddha) & The Grand Palace

Temple of the Emerald Buddha and officially as Wat Phra Si Rattana Satsadaram, is regarded as the most sacred Buddhist temple (wat) in Thailand. The Emerald Buddha housed in the temple is a potent religio-political symbol and the palladium (protective image) of Thai society. It is located in Phra Nakhon District, the historic centre of Bangkok, within the precincts of the Grand Palace.

Getting there: By car - Na Phralan Road / By boat – Maharaj Pier

Open daily 08:30 AM - 3:30 PM

Admission fee: 500 Baht

Dress code: shorts and sleeveless shirts are not allowed. Please present your passport at the security check point before the entrance.



Wat Arun (Temple of Dawn)

A Buddhist temple (*wat*) in Bangkok Yai district of Bangkok, Thailand, on the Thonburi west bank of the Chao Phraya River. The temple derives its name from the Hindu god Aruna, often personified as the radiations of the rising sun. Wat Arun is among the best known of Thailand's landmark. The first light of the morning reflects off the surface of the temple with pearly iridescence. Although the temple had existed since at least the seventeenth century, its distinctive *prang* (spires) were built in the early nineteenth century during the reign of King Rama II.

Getting there: By boat - Arun Pier
Open daily 08:30 AM -5:30 PM
Admission fee: 100 Baht



Asiatique the Riverfront

The East Asiatic pier has been restored to its original glory under the name "ASIATIQUE -The Riverfront". The first and the biggest lifestyle project in Asia on the banks of the Chao Phraya River features shopping, dining, a riverside promenade and Ferris wheel.

Opening hours: Daily 5:00PM – 12:00AM
Getting there: Take BTS Ratchadamri to Sapan Taksin station and connect to Asiatique the Riverfront ferry from Taksin pier.

Maggie Choo's

Maggie Choo's operates normally on regular nights as a stylish nightclub, featuring various live bands, performers and singers. Large gay crowd, with many foreigners, especially on Sundays.
