



Paris!

Simply asleep at the end of the 20th century, Paris has become once again a modern city awake to the world. Thanks in part to Mayor Bertrand Delanoë, who took office in 2001, the city has undergone profound transformations. To name just a few: Paris Plage (which every summer transforms the borders of the Seine into a huge beach promenade), La Nuit Blanche (which gives the keys to the city to artists every October) and the Vélib', the ubiquitous bicycle rental system that has changed the nature of transportation in Paris.

The gay community, meanwhile, has grown up next door to the city and has also led the way. Much of its heart still resides in the central Marais district, where you'll find dozens of gay bars, restaurants and establishments. Whether you prefer trendy or comfortable scenes, whether your passion is for R&B, traditional music, or French and international pop, there is room for everyone.



Gays and lesbians are as integrated into daily life here as they are everywhere else in the world. The community is less aware of its identity than in many American cities, perhaps because it is less necessary: resistance to equality has eroded or gone underground long ago. They can be seen in thousands of cafes and restaurants, in gay bookstores, or simply browsing the prolific gay media options in the Marais, where they will be reading for the evening.

And since the Marais has become so expensive, you'll probably meet friendly faces in all parts of the city, from Montmartre to Saint Germain des Prés.

It's hard to get bored in Paris! Did you know that Paris is ranked among the top 10 gay destinations to discover? In summer and winter, in autumn and spring, you will have plenty of choice so you will never get bored!

Entertainment is king in the City of Lights. You'll also find many activities to do. If you have never visited Paris as a tourist, don't miss the opportunity to do so. If you are like those many gay tourists who come back to experience Paris "by the night", every time, it's a sure hit. For Paris or for Parisians?

A humanist metropolis of love, food, art, design, shopping and nightlife. Gay and lesbian tourists are considered a natural part of society. So it's not surprising that the Paris Gay Pride is so popular every year. The gay pride march is usually held at the end of June. It's also not surprising that Paris is one of the most popular gay destinations in the world knowing that Paris is the favorite gay destination for tourists of all classes.

In summer, Paris is simply magical. However, the City of Lights is a destination to do, no matter what the season is, whether it is during the high tourist season or not. It must be said that during the month of August, there are few Parisians living there. Vacations mean that people leave Paris to travel and enjoy the countryside. You simply won't realize that there are fewer people. On the contrary. August is very popular with tourists so the city is bustling with all kinds of activities.



In summer, it is also a time to take the time. The parks are popular at lunchtime, the boulevards lined with monuments fascinate every day, and the emblematic bistros of the gay district of Paris, Le Marais, make the day even more enjoyable. As soon as evening arrives, the nightlife begins and the bars and discos open their doors. You can find everything in Paris. A gay bear bar, a fetish disco or parties that will only happen once in your life.

A traditionally liberal country that legalized homosexuality in 1791 during the French Revolution and gay marriage in 2013, France is frequently named as one of the most gay-friendly countries in the world, ahead of Canada.

Homosexual tourists do not need to take extra precautions when visiting Paris. By going to the Marais district, you will quickly feel at home. A beautiful neighborhood with the colors of the rainbow.

Paris is also a nightlife, world-class museums, haute couture boutiques, iconic architecture, French gastronomy and cuisine, and an intoxicating atmosphere will make your trip to Paris even more enjoyable. If Paris is the French destination to do, all around, you will find many tourist attractions especially in the Ile-de-France region. Imagine seeing castles like Versailles and the most beautiful parks in the country.

Throughout the year, the LGBT scene is distinguished in various fields ranging from cinema to sports, literature, visual arts and music.

In March/April, it is the cinema that honors LGBT creation, with the International Women's Film Festival on one hand and the Queer Artists Film Festival on the other. It is also the month when Queer Week takes place in many places in the Ile-de-France region with a heterogeneous program of debates, hikes, parties and performances. On the exhibition side, it is the Printemps des assocés, with its exhibitions, workshops and activities, which is essential.

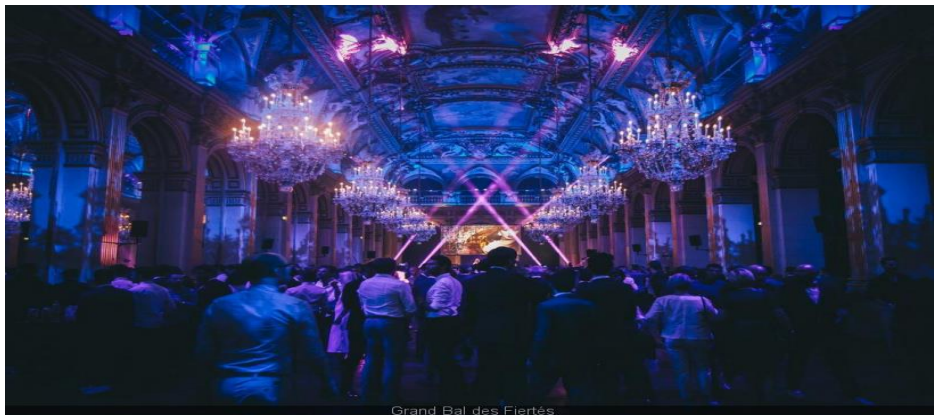
In June, a few days before the LGBT Pride March, the TIP (Paris International Tournament) brings together athletes from around the world for an event open to all, regardless of gender, age or performance. On the eve of the Pride March, find the Rainbow Manège event at the Jardin des Tuileries, where all the funds are donated to two associations for the defense of LGBT rights. And at the very beginning of the month, the Disneyland Paris amusement park dons the colors of the rainbow for the Magical Pride!

In July, Loud & Proud sheds light on the creativity of sexual minorities during a multidisciplinary festival offering concerts, performances and screenings.

At the beginning of the school year, the multidisciplinary festival of queer and alternative cultures Jerk Off invites the public to attend shows of all kinds: theater, dance, readings, performances... There's something for everyone!

In October, the trans community and those who support them tour the city for the Existrans.

November is THE month of gay, lesbian, bi and trans culture and has 3 must-see film events at the end of the year. Between Chéries-Chéris and the Paris International Lesbian and Feminist Film Festival, there's plenty to see! Books are also in the spotlight with the Gay Book Fair, which highlights a little-observed part of literary production. A rare opportunity to make discoveries and meet great authors.

Rue de Charonne, the Violette & Co bookshop plays on the same themes, with a feminist touch in addition. On the side of La Musardine, it is finally eroticism in all its forms which is approached.

The Marais, a lively and festive neighborhood for the LGBTQ+ community, but also Pigalle and its former lesbian cabarets, the Palais Royal, a mecca for men's meetings in the 18th century, or the Père Lachaise cemetery and its tombs of gay personalities: gay Paris has been written for centuries and its heritage can be discovered during guided tours.

Paris Gay Village

In your discovery of gay and lesbian Paris, Paris Gay Village will be your ally. Since 2005, the tour guides of this association have concocted about thirty guided tours, several of which are available in English. Explore the Madeleine neighborhood to learn all about the life of Jean Cocteau, stroll through Saint-Germain-des-Prés, where the LGBT community of the 50s and 60s vibrated, wander through the cemeteries in search of those graves where gay couples, in love for eternity, rest...

Meeting The French

Want to know all the secrets of the Marais? Meeting the French's gay friendly guided tour offers you the opportunity to discover this historic district through its bars, clubs, restaurants and stores familiar with LGBTQ+ culture. Between old buildings and quaint boutiques, it's also an opportunity to learn more about the history of the gay community in Paris.

If there is one neighborhood in Paris that is particularly popular with the LGBT community, it is the Marais! Nestled between the Bastille, Republic and City Hall squares, it concentrates the majority of the gay friendly places in the capital. Bars, clubs and shops of all kinds have taken place there over the last 30 years, making this neighborhood a small authentic but trendy village where all kinds of visitors meet.

Ideal for shopping, the neighborhood has many must-see shopping spots, including designer boutiques, designer stores and the famous Bazar de l'Hôtel de Ville (BHV Marais).

The Marais is also renowned for its cultural dynamism. Some of the greatest museums of Paris (Centre Pompidou, Picasso Paris National Museum, Cognacq-Jay Museum...) as well as numerous art galleries (Thaddaeus Ropac, Daniel Templon, Karsten Greve...) have settled there, making this district a must for the Parisian artistic life.

It is also in the Marais that every year, at the end of June, the participants in one of the major festivals of Paris meet: the Pride march.

Here is a selection of 10 places not to be missed during a walk in the Marais:



Le BHV Marais

52 rue de Rivoli, Paris, 75004

In the heart of Paris, a stone's throw from Notre-Dame and opposite the City Hall, in the trendy and cultural district of Paris, the BHV Marais is THE new place to stroll and shop that cannot be ignored.

What's new? A beautifully restored facade, 45,000 m² redesigned in a contemporary and warm layout, 900 brands to discover, entertainment to experience every day...

Creative, inspiring, relaxed, Le BHV Marais does not forget its faithful fans of DIY, culture and home furnishings.

Fashion is added to its favorite universes, to complete the wide range of products offered by this multi-specialist department store.

For 160 years, Le BHV Marais has been the only life-style department store in Paris, where you can find such a diversity of worlds under one roof!



Maison de Victor Hugo

Hôtel de Rohan-Guéméné - 6 place des Vosges, Paris, 75004

Located on the prestigious Place de Vosges, in the heart of the Marais district, Victor Hugo's house invites the visitor to enter into the intimacy of the famous French writer. He lived on the second floor of this mansion from 1832 to 1848, and wrote some of his major works and a large part of the "Misérables". The visit of the apartment follows the three main stages of his life: before, during and after his exile in Guernsey, through the presentation of his furniture, various memorabilia and his astonishing interior decorations. The second floor is reserved for temporary exhibitions and presents his drawings as well as an iconography of his literary work. The museum organizes conference visits in Victor Hugo's apartment and workshops for the youngest visitors (information at the museum secretariat). A rich library is open to the public by appointment.



Place des Vosges

It is the jewel of the neighborhood, which however does not lack attractions! The Place des Vosges is one of the oldest in Paris, and also one of the most beautiful. Visitors stroll under its arcades or in the alleys of the central garden, and take the opportunity to admire the superb red brick facades. The shops, open on Sundays, contribute to the animation of the place. The square is the ideal starting point for a walk in the Marais, one of the most charming historic districts of the capital, for the heritage treasures it houses and the atmosphere it exudes. The many 17th and 18th century mansions have been transformed into museums of international renown: Picasso Paris museum, Carnavalet museum, Victor Hugo's house... Rue des Rosiers, the epicenter of the Parisian Jewish community, is to be discovered for its atmosphere, stores and restaurants. And there are countless bars and clubs that make the Marais the largest gay neighborhood in France.



Centre Pompidou

Rue Beaubourg, côté Saint-Merri (jusqu'en mai 2021), Paris, 75004

The Centre Pompidou, created by Renzo Piano and Richard Rogers, is an architectural marvel of the 20th century, recognizable by its outdoor escalators and its enormous colorful pipes. It houses the National Museum of Modern Art, a world reference for its collections of 20th and 21st century art. The works of key artists are chronologically distributed over two areas: the modern period from 1905 to 1960 (Matisse, Picasso, Dubuffet ...) and the contemporary period from 1960 to today (Andy Warhol, Niki de Saint Phalle, Anish Kapoor ...). In addition to these permanent collections, exhibitions of international renown are organized all year round on the top floor, from where the panoramic view over the center of Paris and its rooftops is breathtaking. You are welcome to spend half a day or even a whole day there: you can eat at the Georges, learn at the Public Information Library and stroll through the store's shelves. At the foot of the Center, in the Piazza, the Brancusi workshop presents a unique collection of the works of this major artist in the history of modern sculpture.



Museum national Picasso-Paris

5 rue de Thorigny, Paris, 75003

The collection of the Museum national Picasso-Paris includes more than 5,000 works and 200,000 archival pieces. By its quality, its scope as well as the diversity of the artistic fields represented, it is the largest collection of Picasso's work in the world and allows a journey through the artist's entire painted, sculpted, engraved and drawn work, as well as a precise evocation of his creative process. The museum proposes a varied cultural offer, aimed at all types of public, with the ambition to share Picasso's work with as many people as possible. Come and explore the richness of Picasso's creation and make your encounter with the works a unique experience.



Hotel de Béthune-Sully

62 rue Saint-Antoine, Paris, 75004

Between courtyard and garden, the Hôtel de Béthune-Sully is one of the most beautiful private mansions in Paris. In the heart of the Marais, this 17th century monument was the residence of the Superintendent of Finances of Henri IV, Maximilien de Béthune, Duke of Sully. Since 1967, it houses the headquarters of the Centre des monuments nationaux. The Cour d'Honneur houses its information center. The bookshop is accessible to all. Installed in the large lower hall, one can observe its ceiling with beams and painted joists. The garden, originally made up of plant embroidery, gives access to the Place des Vosges. It is not open to the public but you can cross the courtyard and the garden during opening hours to access the Place des Vosges.



Hôtel de Ville de Paris

Mairie de Paris - Place de l'Hôtel de Ville, Paris, 75004

Since 1357, Paris City Hall has been the seat of the Parisian municipality. The current building, in neo-Renaissance style, was rebuilt by the architects Théodore Ballu and Edouard Deperthes on the site of the former City Hall, which burned down during the Paris Commune in 1871. It is possible to visit the Town Hall, a place of power and prestige. Guided tours, upon reservation, are organized by the Protocol Department. The visitor will discover in particular the Salle des Fêtes, designed as a replica of the Hall of Mirrors in Versailles. Large free exhibitions are also organized and meet with great success.



Musée Cognacq-Jay - Le goût du XVIIIe

8 rue Elzévir, Paris, 75003

The Cognacq-Jay Museum, in the heart of the Marais, recreates the atmosphere of a Parisian residence in the Age of Enlightenment. Housed in a beautiful 16th century mansion, between the courtyard and the garden, the museum houses an exceptional collection of 18th century works of art: paintings by Boucher, Chardin and Fragonard, drawings by Watteau, sculptures, stamped

furniture and precious objects (jewelry, snuff boxes, Saxon porcelain...). Ernest Cognacq and his wife Louise Jay, founders of the department store La Samaritaine, bequeathed the collections to the City of Paris in 1928.



Museum des Arts et Métiers

60 rue Réaumur, Paris, 75003

The museum's treasures retrace the history of techniques, since the 15th century, in seven fields: scientific instruments, materials, construction, communication, energy, mechanics and transport. The former abbey of Saint-Martin-des-Champs serves as a showcase for the collections, presented chronologically. Visitors will discover a charming automaton from 1784, La Joueuse de tympanon, the famous Foucault's Clock (1851) and an airplane from 1897. The visit ends... in the Arts et Métiers metro station, inspired by Jules Verne's Nautilus.



Musée de la Chasse et de la Nature

62 rue des Archives, Paris, 75003

The Hunting and Nature Museum is located in the mansions of Guénégaud (17th century) and Mongelas (18th century), in the heart of the historic district of the Marais. It is in this prestigious setting that the visitor (amateur or curious) discovers paintings (Desportes, Chardin, Oudry, Vernet), hunting weapons, naturalized animals from Africa, America and Asia as well as many art objects.

Paris has many addresses claiming a particular sympathy for the LGBT community. Often located in the Marais, but not only, they contribute to making Paris a welcoming and festive city. Here's a short overview of the unmissable addresses!

Capital of gastronomy, Paris is full of gourmet addresses of all kinds, from small Parisian brasseries to large restaurants. Mainly located in the Marais district, but a little bit everywhere in Paris, some establishments especially welcome the LGBT community, which is often indicated by a rainbow symbol on their storefront.

Looking for a lively atmosphere? The transformist cabarets offer you dinner in the company of the most beautiful replicas of stars: Kylie Minogue, Céline Dion, Edith Piaf, Lady Gaga... They offer you a show out of the ordinary and unusual moments ranging from comedy to emotion. See you at Chez Michou or at the Artishow.

Whether you are looking for burgers, traditional French cuisine, gastronomy or tapas, here is a selection of addresses to treat you.

Gay and lesbian bars in Paris



Le Marais, once a unique landmark in the community, still has some emblematic establishments. For a drink during the day or in the evening, go to the Open Café! With its corner terrace and a few tables, this café is undoubtedly one of the most popular spots when the weather is nice. Not far from there,

the COX is also an address not to be missed in the neighborhood. Opened since 1995, this trendy bar attracts a varied clientele so numerous that they spill over onto the surrounding sidewalks sipping glasses, like at the Quetzal. Friendly atmosphere guaranteed! Le Like, former "Village", and its drag queen shows are an institution: it is the first Parisian bar to have claimed to be gay. On the rue des Lombards, the atmosphere is: virile at the Bear's den with its well-named population, more mixed with The Labo Bar Club. To dance while having a drink, take a trip to Les Souffleurs, where the team serves the unmissable cocktails. El Hombre, as its name suggests, is the men's landmark for having a drink, enjoying tapas and enjoying a rich and varied program until late at night on weekends! Other bars with a friendly atmosphere, the Café Voulez-Vous on rue du Temple, the Who's bar on rue Saint-Merriou and the Duplex on rue Michel Le Comte. At La Mine, you will find the fetish community of Paris and at the Mic Man its famous speed-dating! And to sing the hits of yesteryear and the hits of today, L'Enchanteur organizes karaoke evenings.

If you move away from the Marais, you will quickly come across an institution of Parisian gay nights recognizable by its exotic facade (and its late happy hour): the Banana Café. Near the Gare de l'Est train station, the Café Moustache is one of the oldest gay bars in the capital. And from May to October, the banks of the Seine Rive droite is home to the summer barge Le Marcounet, a venue open all year round that hosts jazz & world concerts, cabarets and cultural events.

For several years now, places to go out have been springing up in the districts near the Marais up to the 19th and 20th arrondissements. Among the newcomers to the gay and lesbian scene, Le 17 is located 17 rue de la Folie Méricourt with DJs and regular entertainment, while at Le M'sieurs Dames, avenue Parmentier, afterworks (DRH evening, La Martine), Queermess and bingo lotto animated by drag queens are held.

For a girls' night out, head for the surroundings of the Centre Pompidou, where the Mutinerie and the Bar'ouf share a busy section of rue Saint-Martin. Workshops, concerts and other events punctuate the festive program of these 2 unmissable addresses of Parisian lesbian nights. Still in the Marais, the 3W Kafé (Women With Women) is an emblematic place of the district which proposes a cosy atmosphere and dance parties.

A few steps away, it's the Champmeslé, one of the first bars for girls to open in the 70s, which hosts! Atypical animations are organized there, such as cabaret or clairvoyance evenings in a relaxed atmosphere.

LGBT clubs in Paris



After 2am, go to one of the friendly LGBT addresses in Paris to dance until dawn! At the Tango (La Boîte à frissons) you can sway your hips in a good-natured atmosphere with a musical program ranging from pop to kitsch hits. Lesbians, gays, bi, trans, straight, everyone is welcome! At the So What? we enjoy a live program every Thursday and we dance especially between girls on Dj sets every weekend, a mojito in the hand.

Sexy address of the neighborhood, the Raidd Bar is a must in the Marais with its surprising decor and its gogo dancers. At the CUD, one of the most popular places for men in the Marais, it is on a basement dance floor that we dance to the sound of the hits of the moment, while at the Gibus, near the Canal St-Martin, the evenings follow one another without being alike.

The Depot Club & Cruising is a must for the Parisian LGBT+ night: open every day, cruising for men in the afternoon... The Klub is the queer reference dedicated to experimental music.

Gay and lesbian evenings in Paris

Regularly, the Parisian LGBT community (or passing through) meets for recurring parties in different places in Paris, where everyone is welcome.

In Paris, the number of itinerant parties is multiplying! Don't miss the famous Wet For Me evenings (by the Barbieturix collective) or Flash Cocotte which change places almost every year (Cabaret Sauvage, Wanderlust, Social Club among others). In the park of La Villette, the bar-restaurant A La Folie hosts many gay and gay-friendly evenings in its club area. The Point Ephémère, on the banks of the Canal Saint Martin, is also a popular party venue for the LGBT community.

Another not-to-be-missed evening is the Bizarre Love Triangle electro party that has been held at Maxim's for over ten years. The Doctor Love is held at Club Haussmann and Le Dépôt, rue aux Ours, organizes clubbing evenings on weekends. In the district of Château d'eau, in the 10th arrondissement, the club Les Etoiles hosts gay evenings such as the one dedicated to disco music La Madame Klaude.

On the Gibus and Bataclan sides, the Nuits des Follivores / Crazyvores animate the République district in an offbeat atmosphere to the sound of French and international hits. Warm atmosphere until dawn! In the Java style, gay evenings follow one another, like the Trou aux biches, while on Sundays, the Badaboum hosts the gay friendly meeting of Bastille. The BearDrop enlivens the 16th arrondissement with their pop house sound.

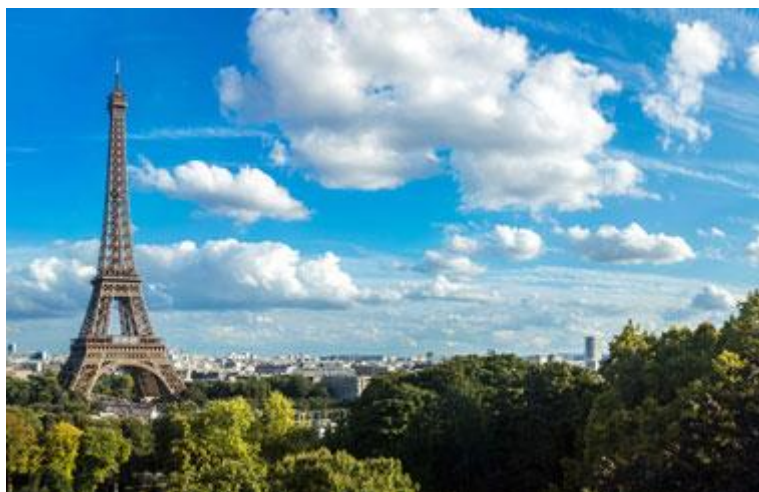
Sunday evening has become a must with several gay nights at the Rosa Bonheur in the Buttes Chaumont park, or in various bars such as Le Café A for the evening called La Dimanche and at the club le Badaboum near Bastille.

The LGBT community also meets regularly around afterworks organized in different places for very distinct atmospheres. Find L'apéro des garçons which comes back every Saturday of the summer for a drink on the terrace of La Boîte, La Martine and La Grosse Martine on Fridays during the summer period and on Thursdays the rest of the year, La Puti Vuelta comes back every first Friday of the month in a different place to reach an international clientele. Other festive moments: the evenings of LGBT festivals such as Loud & Proud which is organized at La Gaité Lyrique or the closing night of the TIP, Tournoi International de Paris.
