### Sightseeing Highlights in Malta

MDINA – The old Capital City where the hotel itself is located. The history of Mdina traces back more than 4000 years. According to tradition it was here that in 60 A.D. that the Apostle St. Paul is said to have lived after being shipwrecked on the Islands. Furthermore, it is said that St. Paul resided inside the grotto known as Fuori le Mura (outside the city walls) now known as St. Paul's Grotto in Rabat. Lamp lit by night and referred to as "the silent city", Mdina is fascinating to visit for its timeless atmosphere as well as its cultural and religious treasures.



Mdina has had different names and titles depending on its rulers and its role but its medieval name describes it best – 'Citta' Notabile': the noble city.

It was home then, as now, to Malta's noble families; some are descendants of the Norman, Sicilian and Spanish overlords who made Mdina their home from the 12th century onwards. Impressive palaces line its narrow, shady streets.







Mdina is one of Europe's finest examples of an ancient walled city and extraordinary in its mix of medieval and baroque architecture.

Valletta – Malta's Capital city is the Europe's tiniest capital, surrounded by sea and 16th-century bastion walls, has an enduring charm all of its own. A Unesco World Heritage site steeped in history, Valletta is in the midst of a 21st-century revitalisation. It emerged from its year as European Capital of Culture in 2018 with more hotels, restaurants and historic treasures and the momentum has not let up since.

Valletta has an extraordinary density of sights and activities too: from 5,000-year-old 'Fat Lady' statues, to the ornate Baroque legacy of the Knights of St John; from Bastion-top gardens to boat trips on the Grand Harbour. And it isn't all ancient. There's also the City Gate redevelopment, designed by star architect Renzo Piano (of London's Shard fame) inside the bombed-out shell of the Neoclassical opera house.

Buzzing bars spill out onto the city's limestone alleys, concerts frequently grace its copious churches, and the restaurant scene serves the best bites in Malta.







#### Marsaxlokk

The small and picturesque fishing village of Marsaxlokk (pronounced marsa-schlock – meaning southeastern port) is located in the South-Eastern part of Malta, adjacent to Żejtun, Marsaskala and Birżebbuga



The town offers a selection of the finest fish restaurants on the island, peaceful walks around the coast and harbour, as well as for its secluded and untainted swimming zones in the area around Marsaxlokk. Tourists and locals alike make their way to this Sunday market to buy locally caught fresh fish and seafood, as well as everyday items, such as locally produced honey, fruit jam, wine, vegetables, souvenirs, and clothes.








# Megalithic Temples in Malta: The Oldest in the World

Although small in size, Malta is home to the oldest free-standing structures in the world - older than Stonehenge and the Great Egyptian Pyramids! In fact, the Megalithic Temples of Malta date back to 3600-2500 B.C., with the Ggantija Temples in Gozo being classified as the oldest structure in the world, dating back to around 3600-3200 B.C. There are several pre-historic temples scattered around the Maltese islands, seven of which are listed as UNESCO World Heritage Sites. The temples were built using mostly materials such as coralline rock and globigerina limestone.










#### Malta Beaches

Most beaches around the Maltese islands are recognised as having some of the cleanest bathing waters around the EU, with a 97% evaluation of excellent quality, placing Malta high on the list among EU states.

A few beaches are also Blue Flag certified, which means such beaches adhere to standards for sustainable development, environmental management, safety and other services









#### Gozo and Comino

Steeped in myth, Gozo is thought to be the legendary Calypso's isle of Homer's Odyssey – a peaceful, mystical backwater. Baroque churches and old stone farmhouses dot the countryside. Gozo's rugged landscape and spectacular coastline await exploration with some of the Mediterranean's best dive sites.

The island also comes complete with historical sites, forts and amazing panoramas, as well as one of the archipelago's best-preserved prehistoric temples, Ġgantija.









To discover the true magic of swimming, diving and enjoying all the activities the sea has to offer, Comino is the Island that must be explored. The island's Blue Lagoon, with its safe bathing in bright turquoise waters, makes a memorable day out by boat.



#### Walks and hikes

From mid-November until mid-May or so, you'll find the Islands green and lush. Fields are full of vegetables and waysides are carpeted with fennel, clover, wild iris, myrtle and much more. By late spring, a thousand or more species of plants will be in flower.

Away from the resorts and urban areas of central Malta, there is a surprising amount of countryside, some left almost untouched by modernity. You may be surprised to learn that only around one-fifth of the Maltese Islands is urbanised. Farmers often use traditional labour-intensive methods of the past. Village life still centres on the agricultural and fishing seasons. The Islands offer walkers some of the most stunning views anywhere in the Mediterranean. The first thing to do is to decide what sort of view you prefer – dramatic cliffs plunging into waves, the rocky, scrubland of the garrigue or hidden, lush valleys. En route, you'll come across mysterious, prehistoric sites, cave chapels and secluded palaces of the Knights.









In Malta, areas that make excellent day hikes, are Mellieħa, Dingli, Għar Lapsi, Fawwara, Wardija, all the North and the various bays, and the southern coast with its fishing villages and Delimara Point


